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Addressing Absenteeism

This document outlines key considerations for stakeholders when evaluating the adoption of the *Responsive Classroom* approach to teaching and discipline.

Increase feelings of belonging.

Create welcoming school and classroom environments where students feel accepted and appreciated.

• For example, more student work should be displayed in the building instead of keeping student work digital.

In middle schools, lead regularly scheduled <u>Responsive</u> <u>Advisory Meetings</u>.

• Ten to fifteen students meet with a teacher they might know from a different part of their school day for about twenty minutes.



- The teacher leads them through an arrival welcome, announcements, acknowledgments, and an activity.
- Educators appreciate the opportunity to get to know students better, and students respond enthusiastically to feeling seen and heard by an adult at school.

Use Kaleidoscope to provide a holistic view of the school or district.

Kaleidoscope is an online tool that provides feedback on how effectively a school implements Responsive Classroom practices schoolwide.
