

1 Positive language is a powerful tool for building a calm, safe learning environment.

When all the adults at school—not just classroom teachers—use positive language, students hear consistent messages about behavior expectations, which leads to a stronger sense of safety. As a result, students are more likely to meet established behavior expectations in all areas of the school.

2 Focus on reinforcing and reminding language.

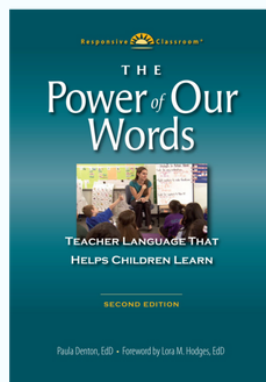
In the Responsive Classroom approach, positive adult language is direct, brief, and focused on specific actions that help students meet academic and behavioral expectations and thrive as valued members of a learning community.

Two types of positive adult language are particularly beneficial for all staff:

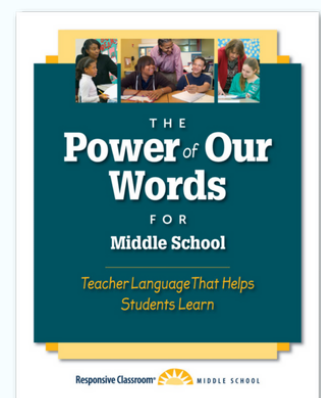
- **Reinforcing language** names strengths. By highlighting their skills, positive efforts and attitudes, and quality work, reinforcing language gives students a scaffold to stand on as they reach for the next higher level in their learning.
- **Reminding language** sets students up for success before a possibly challenging task or prompts them as they begin to go off track so they can stay on task, organized, responsible, and safe.

3 Provide training in positive teacher language for all the adults in the school.

- Have staff practice crafting and delivering positive language—with partners or in small groups—using real scenarios that staff may encounter.
- Provide helpful sentence starters:
 - “I can see . . .”
 - “You remembered . . .”
 - “Show me . . .”
